3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Border Enforcement,

5 Security, and Trade (BEST) Facilitation Act of 2023".

6 SEC. 2. OFFICE OF FIELD OPERATIONS IMAGE TECHNICIAN
7 PILOT PROGRAM.

8 (a) IN GENERAL.—Section 411(g) of the Homeland
9 Security Act of 2002 (6 U.S.C. 211(g)) is amended by
10 adding at the end the following:

11 "(6) Image technician pilot program.—

1	"(A) IMAGE TECHNICIAN 1.—
2	"(i) IN GENERAL.—There shall be in
3	the Office of Field Operations, Image
4	Technician 1 positions, which shall be
5	filled in accordance with the provisions
6	under chapter 33 (relating to appointments
7	in the competitive service) and chapters 51
8	and 53 (relating to classification and rates
9	of pay) of title 5, United States Code.
10	"(ii) Conditions.—Image Technician
11	1 positions—
12	"(I) may be filled by existing
13	U.S. Customs and Border Protection
14	employees;
15	"(II) are not law enforcement of-
16	ficer positions; and
17	"(III) may not be filled by inde-
18	pendent contractors.
19	"(iii) DUTIES.—The duties of an
20	Image Technician 1 shall include—
21	"(I) reviewing non-intrusive in-
22	spection images of conveyances and
23	containers entering or exiting the
24	United States through a land, sea, or

1	air port of entry or international rail
2	crossing;
3	"(II) assessing whether images of
4	conveyances and containers appear to
5	contain anomalies indicating the po-
6	tential presence of contraband, per-
7	sons unlawfully seeking to enter or
8	exit the United States, or illicitly con-
9	cealed merchandise, including illicit
10	drugs and terrorist weapons;
11	"(III) recommending entry re-
12	lease or exit release for any convey-
13	ances and containers whenever the im-
14	ages of such items do not include no-
15	ticeable anomalies indicating the po-
16	tential presence of contraband, per-
17	sons seeking to unlawfully enter or
18	exit the United States, or illicitly con-
19	cealed merchandise, including illicit
20	drugs or terrorist weapons, to the
21	U.S. Customs and Border Protection
22	Officer responsible for inspecting such
23	conveyance or container; and
24	"(IV) recommending further in-
25	spection of any conveyances and con-

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1	tainers whenever the Image Techni-
2	cian reasonably believes that an image
3	of any such item contains anomalies
4	indicating the potential presence of
5	contraband, persons seeking to unlaw-
6	fully enter or exit the United States,
7	or illicitly concealed merchandise,
8	such as illicit drugs or terrorist weap-
9	ons, to the U.S. Customs and Border
10	Protection officer who is responsible
11	for inspecting such conveyance or con-
12	tainer.
13	"(B) IMAGE TECHNICIAN 2.—
14	"(i) IN GENERAL.—There shall be in
15	the Office of Field Operations, Image
16	Technician 2 positions, which shall be
17	filled in accordance with the provisions
18	under chapter 33 (relating to appointments
19	in the competitive service) and chapters 51
20	and 53 (relating to classification and rates
21	of pay) of title 5, United States Code.
22	"(ii) Conditions.—Image Technician
23	2 positions—

1	"(I) may be filled by existing
2	U.S. Customs and Border Protection
3	employees;
4	"(II) are not law enforcement of-
5	ficer positions; and
6	"(III) may not be filled by inde-
7	pendent contractors.
8	"(iii) DUTIES.—The duties of an
9	Image Technician 2 shall include—
10	"(I) carrying out all of the duties
11	described in subclauses (I) through
12	(IV) of subparagraph (A)(ii);
13	"(II) receiving intelligence from
14	the National Targeting Center regard-
15	ing tactics, techniques, and proce-
16	dures being used at ports of entry and
17	in the border environment by malign
18	actors to facilitate the unlawful entry
19	or exit of contraband, persons, or illic-
20	itly concealed merchandise, such as il-
21	licit drugs or terrorist weapons; and
22	"(III) reporting new information
23	to the National Targeting Center re-
24	garding tactics, techniques, and proce-
25	dures being used at ports of entry and

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1	in the border environment by malign
2	actors to facilitate the unlawful entry
3	or exit of contraband, persons, or con-
4	cealed merchandise, such as illicit
5	drugs or terrorist weapons.
6	"(C) SUPERVISORY U.S. CUSTOMS AND
7	BORDER PROTECTION OFFICERS.—
8	"(i) SUPERVISION.—All image techni-
9	cians shall be supervised by a Supervisory
10	U.S. Customs and Border Protection Offi-
11	cer.
12	"(ii) Discretion and decision-mak-
13	ING AUTHORITY.—The appropriate Super-
14	visory U.S. Customs and Border Protec-
15	tion Officer, while working with image
16	technicians, shall retain the discretion and
17	final decision-making authority—
18	"(I) to release conveyances or
19	cargo for entry; or
20	"(II) to refer such conveyance or
21	cargo for further inspection.
22	"(iii) TRAINING.—A Supervisory U.S.
23	Customs and Border Protection Officer
24	who supervises image technicians shall re-

1 ceive additional training in accordance with
2 subparagraph (D).
3 "(D) TRAINING REQUIREMENTS.—All
4 image technicians shall receive annual training
5 and additional ad hoc training, to the extent
6 necessary based on current trends, regarding—
7 "(i) respecting privacy, civil rights,
8 and civil liberties, including the protections
9 against unreasonable searches and seizures
0 afforded by the First and Fourth Amend-
1 ments to the Constitution of the United
2 States;
3 "(ii) analyzing images generated by
4 non-intrusive inspection technologies or
5 any successor technologies deployed by
6 U.S. Customs and Border Protection;
7 "(iii) identifying commodities and
8 merchandise in images generated by non-
9 intrusive inspection technologies or any
successor technologies deployed by U.S.
Customs and Border Protection;
"(iv) identifying contraband, persons
who are seeking to unlawfully enter or exit
the United States, or illicitly concealed
5 merchandise, such as illicit drugs or ter-

1	rorist weapons, in images generated by
2	non-intrusive technologies or any successor
3	technologies deployed by U.S. Customs and
4	Border Protection;
5	"(v) tactics, techniques, and proce-
6	dures being used at ports of entry and in
7	the border environment by malign actors to
8	facilitate the unlawful entry or exit of con-
9	traband, persons, or illicitly concealed mer-
10	chandise, such as illicit drugs or terrorist
11	weapons; and
12	"(vi) any other training that the Com-
13	missioner of U.S. Customs and Border
14	Protection determines to be relevant to the
15	duties described in subparagraphs (A)(iii)
16	or (B)(iii).
17	"(E) ANNUAL ASSESSMENT.—All image
18	technicians shall receive annual testing with re-
19	spect to their—
20	"(i) accuracy in image analysis;
21	"(ii) timeliness in image analysis; and
22	"(iii) ability to ascertain tactics, tech-
23	niques, and procedures being used at ports
24	of entry and in the border environment by
25	malign actors to facilitate the unlawful

1	entry or exit of contraband, persons, or il-
2	licitly concealed merchandise, such as illicit
3	drugs or terrorist weapons.
4	"(F) COMMAND CENTERS.—As part of the
5	pilot program established under this paragraph,
6	the Executive Assistant Commissioner of the
7	Office of Field Operations shall establish 12 re-
8	gional command centers at land, rail, air, and
9	sea ports in which image technicians shall re-
10	view non-intrusive inspection images.
11	"(G) RULE OF CONSTRUCTION.—Nothing
12	in this paragraph may be construed to affect
13	the discretion and final decision-making author-
14	ity given to U.S. Customs and Border Protec-
15	tion Officers to release conveyances or cargo for
16	entry or exit or to refer such conveyances or
17	cargo for further inspection.".
18	(b) Effective Date.—
19	(1) SUNSET.—The amendment made by sub-
20	section (a) shall cease to have effect on the date that
21	is 5 years after the date of the enactment of this
22	Act.
23	(2) TRANSFERS AUTHORIZED.—Upon the ter-
24	mination of the pilot program established by section
25	411(g)(6) of the Homeland Security Act of 2002, as

added by subsection (a), individuals occupying
 Image Technician 1 or Image Technician 2 positions
 in the Office of Field Operations may transfer to
 comparable positions within U.S. Customs and Bor der Protection or the Department of Homeland Se curity.

7 SEC. 3. REPORTING REQUIREMENTS.

8 (a) Semiannual Reports.—Not later than 180 9 days after the hiring of the first positions described in sec-10 tion 411(g)(6) of the Homeland Security Act of 2002, as added by section 2, and every 180 days thereafter, the 11 12 Commissioner of U.S. Customs and Border Protection, in 13 consultation with the Executive Assistant Commissioner of the Office of Field Operations, shall submit a report 14 15 to the Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs of the Senate and the Committee on Home-16 17 land Security of the House of Representatives that identifies-18

19 (1) the number of Image Technician 1 and
20 Image Technician 2 positions filled during the re21 porting period;

(2) the number of Image Technician 1 and
Image Technician 2 positions currently employed by
the Office of Field Operations, disaggregated by—
(A) port of entry or field office;

1	(B) image technician position; and
2	(C) command center, as applicable;
3	(3) the daily average number of images scanned
4	by each Image Technician 1 and each Image Techni-
5	cian 2;
6	(4) training methodologies utilized to train
7	image technicians;
8	(5) assessment passage rates of image techni-
9	cians;
10	(6) the impact of image technicians on interdic-
11	tion rates at ports of entry and international rail
12	crossings at which image technicians are stationed
13	or from which image technicians review images, in-
14	cluding—
15	(A) throughput increases or decreases at
16	such ports of entry and international rail cross-
17	ings;
18	(B) increases or decreases in waiting times
19	at such ports of entry and international rail
20	crossings;
21	(C) average wait times at such ports of
22	entry and international rail crossings; and
23	(D) increases or decreases of seizures of
24	contraband, persons seeking to unlawfully enter
25	or exit the United States, or illicitly concealed

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1	merchandise, such as illicit drugs or terrorist
2	weapons, broken down by type of seizure and
3	port of entry or international rail crossing;
4	(7) the impact of image technicians on U.S.
5	Customs and Border Protection's capability to re-
6	view non-intrusive inspection images of conveyances
7	and containers entering or exiting the United States
8	through a land, sea, or air port of entry or inter-
9	national rail crossing;
10	(8) an assessment of the effectiveness with
11	which image technicians carry out the duties de-
12	scribed in subparagraphs (A)(iii) and (B)(iii) of sec-
13	tion $411(g)(6)$ of the Homeland Security Act of
14	2002, as added by section 2(a), compared to any
15	U.S. Customs and Border Protection officers who
16	are assigned such duties.
17	(9) the progress made in establishing command
18	centers under the pilot program established by such
19	section;
20	(10) any infrastructure or resource needs re-
21	quired to establish such command centers; and
22	(11) the ports of entry and international rail
23	crossing, as applicable, that are supported by such
24	a command center.

1 (b) BIANNUAL BRIEFINGS.—The Executive Assistant 2 Commissioner of the Office of Field Operations shall pro-3 vide biannual briefings to the Committee on Homeland Se-4 curity and Governmental Affairs of the Senate and the 5 Committee on Homeland Security of the House of Rep-6 resentatives regarding the information described in the 7 latest report submitted pursuant to subsection (a).
