3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Cooperation on Com-

5 bating Human Smuggling and Trafficking Act".

6 SEC. 2. DEPARTMENT OF HOMELAND SECURITY PARTNER-

7 SHIPS TO COMBAT HUMAN SMUGGLING AND
8 TRAFFICKING.

9 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of Homeland Secu-10 rity, in coordination with appropriate Federal partners,

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shall combat human smuggling and trafficking by seeking
 to expand partnerships with appropriate law enforcement
 entities in Mexico and Central American and South Amer ican countries, including by—

5 (1) establishing or expanding cross-border
6 transnational criminal investigative units to identify,
7 disrupt, and support the prosecution of human
8 smuggling and trafficking operations;

9 (2) enhancing participation in the Bilateral
10 Human Trafficking Enforcement Initiative or a suc11 cessor initiative; and

(3) providing advanced training for certain investigators and prosecutors from Mexico and such
countries, including training on civil rights, civil liberties, and privacy protections.

16 (b) INVESTIGATION AND PROSECUTION OF HUMAN 17 TRAFFICKING.—The Smuggling AND Secretary of 18 Homeland Security shall evaluate and report to the Com-19 mittee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs 20 of the Senate and the Committee on Homeland Security 21 of the House of Representatives regarding the potential 22 for the expansion of collaborative programs involving 23 Homeland Security Investigations that are aimed at supporting the investigation and prosecution of human smug-24 25 glers and traffickers that pose border security threats and

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operate at the southern land border of the United States,
 including the continuation and expansion of anti-traf ficking coordination teams.

4 (c) INFORMATION CAMPAIGN TO DETER MIGRA-5 TION.—

6 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of Homeland
7 Security shall carry out targeted public information
8 campaigns—

9 (A) to inform targeted migrant populations 10 within Mexico, Central America, South Amer-11 ica, and certain other countries with high mi-12 gration rates regarding the dangers of travel 13 across Mexico to the United States; and

14 (B) to combat misinformation and
15 disinformation by transnational criminal organi16 zations and other nefarious actors regarding
17 United States laws or policies.

18 (2) SPECIFICATIONS.—The information cam19 paigns implemented pursuant to paragraph (1) shall,
20 to the greatest extent possible—

21 (A) be targeted at populations and local22 ities with high migration rates;

23 (B) employ a variety of communications24 media; and

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1	(C) be developed in consultation with ap-
2	propriate program officials of the Department
3	of State and, as appropriate, Mexican, Central
4	American, South American, and other appro-
5	priate foreign governments, nonprofit or aca-
6	demic entities, and representatives acting on be-
7	half of targeted migrant populations, including
8	repatriated migrants.
9	(d) Report on Effective Communications.—Not
10	later than 1 year after the date of the enactment of this
11	Act, the Comptroller General of the United States shall—
12	(1) conduct a study that—
13	(A) assesses the effectiveness of public in-
14	formation campaigns that have been imple-
15	mented by the Department of Homeland Secu-
16	rity to carry out the objectives set forth in sub-
17	section $(c)(1)$; and
18	(B) identifies the best practices with re-
19	spect to such campaigns; and
20	(2) submit a report containing the findings of
21	such study to the Committee on Homeland Security
22	and Governmental Affairs of the Senate and the
23	Committee on Homeland Security of the House of
24	Representatives.
