AN ACT

To authorize the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency of the Department of Homeland Security to hold an annual cybersecurity competition relating to offensive and defensive cybersecurity disciplines, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

1 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

2 This Act may be cited as the “President’s Cup Cyber-
3 security Competition Act”.

4 **SEC. 2. PRESIDENT’S CUP CYBERSECURITY COMPETITION.**

5 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Director of the Cybersecurity
6 and Infrastructure Security Agency (in this section re-
7 ferred to as the “Director”) of the Department of Home-
8 land Security is authorized to hold an annual cybersecu-
9 rity competition to be known as the “Department of
10 Homeland Security Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Se-
11 curity Agency’s President’s Cup Cybersecurity Competi-
12 tion” (in this section referred to as the “competition”) for
13 the purpose of identifying, challenging, and competitively
14 awarding prizes, including cash prizes, to the United
15 States Government’s best cybersecurity practitioners and
16 teams across offensive and defensive cybersecurity dis-
17 ciplines.

18 (b) COMPETITION DESIGN.—

19 (1) IN GENERAL.—Notwithstanding section
20 1342 of title 31, United States Code, the Director,
21 in carrying out the competition, may consult with,
22 and consider advice from, any person who has expe-
23 rience or expertise in the development, design, or
24 execution of cybersecurity competitions.

1 (2) LIMITATION.—The Federal Advisory Com-
2 mittee Act (5 U.S.C. App.) shall not apply to con-
3 sultations pursuant to this section.

4 (3) PROHIBITION.—A person with whom the
5 Director consults under paragraph (1) may not—

6 (A) receive pay by reason of being so con-
7 sulted; or
8 (B) be considered an employee of the Fed-
9 eral Government by reason of so consulting.

10 (c) ELIGIBILITY.—To be eligible to participate in the
11 competition, an individual shall be a Federal civilian em-
12 ployee or member of the uniformed services (as such term
13 is defined in section 2101(3) of title 5, United States
14 Code) and shall comply with any rules promulgated by the
15 Director regarding the competition.

16 (d) COMPETITION ADMINISTRATION.—The Director
17 may enter into a grant, contract, cooperative agreement,
18 or other agreement with a private sector for-profit or non-
19 profit entity or State or local government agency to ad-
20 minister the competition.

21 (e) COMPETITION PARAMETERS.—Each competition
22 shall incorporate the following elements:

23 (1) Cybersecurity skills outlined in the National
24 Initiative for Cybersecurity Education Framework,
25 or any successor framework.

(2) Individual and team events.

(3) Categories demonstrating offensive and defensive cyber operations, such as software reverse engineering and exploitation, network operations, forensics, big data analysis, cyber analysis, cyber defense, cyber exploitation, secure programming, obfuscated coding, or cyber-physical systems.

(4) Any other elements related to paragraphs (1), (2), or (3) as determined necessary by the Director.

(f) USE OF FUNDS.—

16 (A) Advertising, marketing, and promoting
17 the competition.

18 (B) Meals for participants and organizers
19 of the competition if attendance at the meal
20 during the competition is necessary to maintain
21 the integrity of the competition.

(C) Promotional items, including merchandise and apparel.

(D) Monetary and nonmonetary awards for competition participants, including members of the uniformed services.

(E) Necessary expenses for the honorary recognition of competition participants, including members of the uniformed services.

(F) Any other appropriate activity necessary to carry out the competition, as determined by the Director.

(g) PRIZE LIMITATION.—The Director may make one or more awards per competition, except that the amount or value of each shall not exceed \$10,000. The Secretary of Homeland Security may make one or more awards per competition, except the amount or the value of each shall not to exceed \$25,000. A monetary award under this section shall be in addition to the regular pay of the recipient.

20 (h) REPORTING REQUIREMENTS.—The Director shall
21 annually provide to the Committee on Homeland Security
22 of the House of Representatives and the Committee on
23 Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs of the Sen-
24 ate a report that includes the following:

1 (1) A description of available funds under sub-
2 section (f) for each competition conducted in the
3 preceding year.
